# Avoiding the Web of Confusion: Citing Internet Sources 9

You can find great information on the Internet for studying, writing a paper, or doing homework. But even though the material you find there is not taken from a traditional book, you still have to credit the author when you use it as a reference source in your assignment. Summarized below are the basic elements, according to standard MLA format, that you need to include in your citation:

- Name of author or editor, including any appropriate abbreviations indicating position or title.
- 2 Title of the work. For a short story, article or other short work, use quotation marks. For a Web site, Web page, or on-line version of a book, underline.
- Date of electronic publication or posting in this order: day, month, year.
- Name of sponsoring organization.
- Date that you accessed the site in this order: day, month, year.
- **6** The URL <in angle brackets>.

Separate each element of your citation with a period, except for the access date and URL.

Author's name [Last, First]. "Story title." and/or Web site title. Date of Internet publication. Name of any sponsoring organization. Date of access <URL>.

### ...and you're ready to go!

Not every Web page will have all this information available. For instance, professional sites will not always provide an author or a publication date. Confused? Here are some helpful samples:
